

## Religious Education in the Early Years at St.Peter's



The EYFS framework is organised differently to the National Curriculum that is used for children in Year 1 to Year 6: it is organised across seven areas of learning rather than subject areas.

The table below identifies the statements taken from the 2020 Development Matters which are prerequisite skills for Religious Education within the National Curriculum.

The most relevant statements for RE are taken from the following areas of learning:

- · Personal, Social and Emotional Development
- Understanding the World

In addition to the opportunity to develop these skills throughout continuous provision, Reception have a focussed RE session each week and follow the Bury Agreed Syllabus.
