# Collective Worship at St Peter's C.E. Primary School

Schools are required by law to have a daily act of collective worship that is wholly or mainly of Christian character. It is a spiritual occasion, a time for pupils and staff to contemplate and reflect upon the meaning and mystery of life. We understand worship to be a special act or occasion which enables pupils to learn about Jesus Christ and to praise God. Collective worship involves all members of the school coming together and participating in an assembly. We expect everyone to take an active part in collective worship. We conduct our assemblies in a manner that is sensitive to the individual faith and beliefs of all members of the school. Education at St Peter's is rooted in the belief that HOPE, HONESTY and COMPASSION must come first in all we do. Each child has the right to develop morally, spiritually, academically and physically to his/her full potential and will do so, given the right educational context.

## AIMS AND PURPOSE

The aims and purposes of collective worship at St Peter's are to be inclusive, invitational and inspiring.

- Invitational, offering everyone the opportunity to engage in the act of worship, whilst allowing the freedom for those of other faiths and none to be present with integrity.
- Inspiring and creative, impacting the whole community and motivating them into courageous advocacy and action.
- Inclusive, where all are included, have a voice and are listened to.
- A valued part of the culture of the school, breathing life into every aspect of the school day.

## **ORGANISATION AND DELIVERY**

As a church school we follow the Heartsmart approach to deliver collective worship. "Big Questions" are planned for to ensure we offer opportunities for pupils to reflect and grow spiritually. Records of collective worship are kept in class floor books and pupil work produced during class worship is displayed in class reflection areas and on our whole-school reflection display.

Singing assembly occurs weekly, and hymns are carefully selected in advance with the Music teacher to ensure pupil participation and quality.

Pupil Ambassadors (Ethos Group) are engaged in the planning, leading and evaluation of collective worship in order to improve practice. Children use prayer to reflect on our school values and communicate with God as part of our school community.

Pupils recognise that worship provides meaningful opportunities to contribute to their spiritual development. We use the 'Windows, Mirrors, Doors' strategy designed by Liz Mills to broaden and deepen understanding about spiritual learning during collective worship.

## **COURAGEOUS ADVCATES**

As a school, the children love to learn about the courageous advocates out in the world who are seeking to make changes and improve the lives of others. Our Ethos Group are passionate in making a change and firmly believe 'they can change the world'. Pupils have ownership of projects they would like to bring about change and some of these involve: Walk for Ukraine and Harvest (raising money for Manna House). We are fortunate at St.Peter's to also have a School Council and Mental Health Champions. All our 'courageous advocates' work tirelessly for a better world for themselves and others.

#### PRAYER AND LITURGY

Prayer, worship and liturgical celebration are central to our school day. Prayer is encouraged in a variety of methods; private individual prayer, group prayer, and whole school prayer.

Each child takes part in a daily act of worship (5-10 minutes) and formal prayers are used to open and close the school day sessions. The children also plan and lead acts of worship within each of their classes. Collective Worship across every class uses the same structure. We gather, using prayers, actions, or music. Then, we listen to scripture, readings and / or poems. After that, we respond by doing something or saying a prayer together. Finally, we go forth by reflecting on the scripture and taking this forward into our work throughout the day. It is wonderful to see the children excited, enthusiastic and deepening their faith through prayer and liturgy.

#### **RIGHT TO WITHDRAW**

Parents have the right, to withdraw their child from RE lessons and Collective Worship. However, the school asks that parents contact the Head teacher to discuss any concerns about the policy, provision and practice of religious education and seek to arrive at an accommodation.
